PASTOR'S PONDERINGS



He brought them out of darkness and the shadow of death; burst their bonds apart

-Psalm 107:14

He is risen!! Hallelujah!!! Our Saviour lives and His promises have again been fulfilled! These words echo within the rafters of our churches. We have endured the forty days of Lent and we now begin the fifty days of

the Eastertide. God's self-revelation in the Easter event comes to us as a call to spread the Good News of redemption, liberation and of our commissioning to mission and service. We recall the women who first found the Empty Tomb and their zeal to inform the Disciples that Christ is risen indeed!

Ancient tradition teaches that the Resurrection of Jesus marks a new beginning, a chance to rejoice in God's renewal of creation. The late Orthodox theologian Alexander Schmemann handed on this teaching, "God did not create the world for this separation, dying, ruin and corruption...The Resurrection is the re-creation of the world in its original beauty and totality." The resurrection is for all time!! In His death and rising to life again, Jesus gave Himself as a sign of the new and eternal covenant that God is always with us. In giving of Himself, He opened to us a way of freedom and peace. We profess these things in our Eucharistic prayers each week and in our hearts at every moment.

As children of the resurrection, as children of the resurrected God, Jesus not only conquered death, but He also ushered in Life! Not only spiritual life, but full and abundant life, physical and spiritual. He now reigns as the Lord of Life. The Lord who gives new life to His creation-beginning with us!

We belt out, "Jesus Christ is risen today, Hallelujah!" A testament that He has crushed open the finality of death, solidified the defining moment of the liberation of Humanity and testifies to our eventual resurrection.

Indeed, hallelujah, hallelujah, Jesus has brought us out of darkness and the shadow of death and has burst our bonds of sin and death apart...hallelujah, indeed!

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A Chat with MIKE DOOLEY... Part 2: two more love stories

Parishioners and friends of Mike Dooley have asked when the continuing story of his life would appear in *Keeping in Touch*. 30 years ago, he married Kathy Ellis...his second love story we have been fortunate to witness. *BUT*, Mike's story has an even more fascinating chapter.


In Part 1, Mike told me that he had been adopted by Len and Louise Dooley from a Catholic orphanage in St. Agatha when he was 6 months old. He once tried to seek out his birth parents, but didn't pursue it while his adoptive mother was still alive. At age 72, though, he wanted to know his medical family history, and turned to the ancestry.com DNA Testing Service, to learn if he could locate any relatives. When his DNA results arrived in the mail in January 2021, he was amazed to learn that he was 89% French, and there was a DNA match to a first cousin, Richard Foucault. At the same time, a man named Marc, who was researching his Foucault family tree, received an email from ancestry.com, identifying a Mike Dooley as a relative. Marc wrote to Mike, questioning "why this very Irish name was showing up on a very French family tree".

Mike's adoption papers had identified his birth name as Paul Joseph Foucault, born in Galt, and he now had a strong link to a Foucault family. Marc offered to help Mike to find his birth parents, and based on his own family research, he thought Mike's birth mother should be one of the daughters of a certain Espinola, Ontario family. With much care and respect for that family's privacy, Marc contacted a relative who knew the family, to make a discreet inquiry if they would like to pursue contact with Mike Dooley. Kathy provided him with photos of Mike.

On Family Day 2021, the Dooleys received an email from a woman named Jocelyne, who said she thought she may be a sister of Mike; she was also doing her own DNA test to confirm. What a Family Day! Jocelyne spoke to 2 of her sisters, and they were convinced once they saw photos of Mike, who was a ringer for both a brother and his mother. In April, the 3 sisters arranged a ZOOM meeting with Mike and Kathy. Here is how they greeted Mike that first time:



Mike learned that he is the oldest of 10 siblings, 4 sisters, 2 brothers, and 3 previously deceased, the children of Bernadette and Adolphe. When young Bernadette became pregnant, her parents sent her to stay with an uncle in Galt, where her son was born and given up for adoption. Adolphe, the father of baby, followed her, and they eventually married. Their next 3 children were born in Galt, before they moved back to Espinola. None of the siblings knew they had an older brother, but when they met Mike and Kathy in May 2021, they were shocked at how Mike's looks and mannerisms were so like their mother's. Mike says that he was not prepared for the level of acceptance of his birth family and that "within 15 minutes, it was as if we had known each other our whole lives. In a most poignant moment, his siblings sent Mike a parcel containing his Dad's prayer




The siblings have visited back and forth 7 times, and Mike hears from one or more of them every couple of days. One day in downtown Espinola with a sister, another townsperson greeted them with "Is that your brother?"

As his sisters posted on Facebook after their first in-person meeting... And then there were 7.



ANSWERS TO EASTER WORD SEARCH



TRIVIA ANSWERS

- 1. Mark the Evangelist is celebrated on April 25th. His colour is "Red" (the colour of martyrdom). When Mark returned to Alexandria, the pagans of the city resented his efforts to turn the citizens away from the worship of their traditional gods. In 68 AD/CE, the mob placed a rope around his neck and dragged him through the streets until he was dead.
- 2. Tenebrae is Latin for "darkness" or "shadows". Originally it was celebrated in the evenings of the last three days of Holy Week (Holy Wednesday, Maundy Thursday and Good Friday). During the service there is the gradual extinguishing of candles (on the candelabra) and other lights in the church until only a single candle, considered a symbol of our Lord, remains. At the very end of the service a loud noise is made (known as strepitus) symbolizing the earthquake at the time of the Resurrection (Matt. 28:2).
- 3. Pascha
- 4. Traditionally known as "Low Sunday", this is the Octave ("Eighth") Day of Easter.
- 5. (a) 50 (b) Pentecost (this year celebrated on June 5th) (c) The Paschal candle is lit for every service AND the dismissal ends with a single Alleluia (until the Day of Pentecost-when it is doubled again!
