PASTOR'S PONDERINGS

If you have grown up in a church that doesn't keep the church calendar, the significance of doing so is not obvious; meanwhile, even those with a good sense of the calendar can miss the significance of Advent. It is a season in which we are to give special attention (both in our liturgies & in our daily practices) to spiritual things, enacting our expectation of Christ who has left us here for an indeterminate period of time (Acts 1:7), but whose return we await with greatest excitement.



"Keep your candle wicks lit," "stay awake & watch." As Christians, we are meant to do these things each & every day, all year long. Yet, in our daily lives, how we tend — like the disciples in the Garden — to fall asleep, & such life-giving prompts become easier to repeat as mantras than to regularly practice! That is the opportunity Advent opens for us. As the first season in our annual calendar, we look back to remember Jesus' birth in Bethlehem nearly 2,000 years ago while simultaneously looking ahead to the time when Christ will come again, ushering in an age in which all creation will be made new (Revelation 21:5).

A clue to doing so comes in the first week of Advent (December 3), when the prophet Isaiah calls out to God, "O that you would tear open the heavens and come down!" Isaiah wrote more than 2,700 years ago, yet his voice is all urgency, pulling out all the stops, calling out to God. This is what it sounds like to express total confidence in God, complete dependence on our loving Creator/Sustainer/Redeemer. What better way could there be to proclaim this New Year as Christians? I invite you to do so this Advent, & pray that God will draw you into this rhythm of abundant life.

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HOW TO SHOW THE LOVE OF JESUS DURING CHRISTMAS

"Love is patient, love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. It does not dishonor others, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs." –1 Corinthians 13:4-6



Christmas just may be the best time of year to be a witness of the love of Jesus to the world. Of course, any day is a good day to show the love of Jesus, but people seem to be seeking more, hurting more and needing more during Christmas. You can show the love of Jesus, as outlined in 1 Corinthians 13:4-6, by applying each principle to your Christmas activities this year.

- Love is patient. Let's face it. Running errands, shopping, buying gifts, decorating, planning, cooking—it is time-consuming and somewhat intense. There can be a big temptation, even for believers, to become easily frustrated, irritable and impatient. But, God has called us to love others, and part of displaying that love is being patient in parking lots and store lines, and with those who aren't as polite as they should be. Your patience will shine the light of Jesus and stand out in a crowd.
- Love is kind. Take the opportunity to show an extra measure of kindness to those around you this Christmas. Bless your child's teachers with a gift or a special breakfast, reach out to those in need in your community through a food bank or by lending a hand in an elderly neighbor's yard. A small act of kindness goes a long way and gives you the precious chance to be the hands and feet of Jesus to those around you.
- Love does not envy. There may be some great gifts given to those around you this Christmas. Don't give in to the temptation to envy what others have. Rejoice with them, and thank God for the gifts you've been given—whether material or spiritual.
- Love does not boast. If you happen to be the recipient of a wonderful gift, be blessed and enjoy it, but be careful not to boast to others.
- Love is not proud or rude. Do you insist on your own way? When you are shopping or at a relative's home, can people count on you to be a blessing, or have they come to expect criticism and negativity? Be sure your words are edifying only—not critical or harsh. Shine the love of Jesus to everyone around you, and be a light in a dark world!
- Love is not self-seeking. Are you willing to give in to the desires of others now and then? You really wanted to have Christmas at your house this year, but relatives have other ideas. What do you do? Purpose to give preference to others this Christmas, and don't just show up grudgingly, do so with a warm and cheerful heart.
- Love is not easily angered. Do you get angry in traffic? Or how about when people don't move as fast as you'd like in the store and when someone is rude to you at the checkout counter? Instead of letting anger get the best of you, try something different. Determine to remain at peace no matter what. Show love and kindness to others. You never know what they might be going through. A simple act of tenderness may be just what they need.



• Love keeps no record of wrongs. Supernatural forgiveness. That's the heart of Christmas, isn't it? Jesus came to sacrifice Himself and wash all our sins away with His blood. During the season of the greatest act of forgiveness, check your heart and enter into Christmas without a drop of unforgiveness in your heart. If someone wrongs you, determine to forgive them right away.





Moving past grief, on to the right road: an Advent message of hope from PWRDF

"And they will call him Immanuel, which means God with us." So said Matthew in sharing the story of Jesus' birth, reminding listeners and readers of the prophetic words of Isaiah. This season of Advent we are reminded of how much we want to see peace but also hope, joy and love in our world. PWRDF's vision of a truly just, healthy and peaceful world is even more compelling and urgent. Immanuel. God with us. May God especially be with those who are hurting, fearful, angry and grieved. May his presence help us respond to the enormity of grief with an enormity of compassion, one that helps us find and travel a better road to caring for all our neighbours. And as we move through the weeks of Advent with prayer and reflection, let us anticipate the birth of Jesus that brought lowly shepherds and lofty kings to a humble stable, along with a promise of hope.

Interfaith Statement of Solidarity from London's Faith Leaders

(a heartfelt prayer signed by many Anglican, Lutheran, Mennonite, United, Presbyterian and Roman Catholic priests in London, along with many Muslim, Hindu, Jewish and other faith leaders. Even though it was written for citizens of London, the sentiments are true for all of us.)

We, the undersigned, are keenly aware of the incredible pain, worry and fear many in our community are feeling. We live in uncertain times. Many in London have family in the Middle East for whom they worry. Many here are grieving death and loss. Together, we want to acknowledge that pain and suffering as something that transcends religion, race, or ethnicity. We grieve as one human family. As citizens of London, we know all too well how discrimination, acts of hatred and violence can result in the devastating and deplorable loss of innocent lives. It is with that in mind, and in the same spirit with which we have faced adversity in the past, that we stand together in this moment to say that though we have disagreements, we stand as one in saying that this time of profound brokenness cannot be used as a justification for any form of hatred or discrimination. As a praying people, we lament the loss of innocent lives across the Middle East, and we pray for justice for all peoples. We cry out for an end to all violence. We yearn for a lasting peace; peace for Israelis and Palestinians, peace for all global citizens, peace here between us all. We are neighbours. Neighbours who have stood together many times, under the most terrible of circumstances. We stand together again at this terrible time. We will always stand united against hate in all its forms. We offer this statement not to suggest any one political position on how a peace process should unfold, but as faith leaders sharing a message of unity.
