MINISTRY AS A REVERSE-THREAD BOLTS ENDEAVOR

Recently I read an article where the writer compared the work of ministry to reverse-thread bolts. He began the piece, "You know which direction to turn a bolt: clockwise to tighten, counter-clockwise to loosen. Unless, of course, you're working with a reverse-thread bolt. Then you have to do what's opposite to the way you think. Ministry is a reverse-thread endeavor".

In the work of spiritual care here at the shelter and in the community more broadly I recognize this very much to be the case. Here things so often move in a counterintuitive or seemingly counter-productive manner. And sometimes I find myself



completely stuck and at-a-loss. I think that's because I live – we all live – in this world where slogans like 'Got it all together', 'Going somewhere', 'Nailin' it', and 'Reaching my goals' are the credo's that hold all the sway. Success in life is about moving forward and upward – as individual persons, in our relationships, and in the lives of our family. Success in work means achieving results that are measurable, tangible and firm. But ministry is a reverse-thread endeavor. It is all about letting go of things like timelines and deliverables. Or if not exactly letting go of them, then at least reconceptualizing them.

- <u>The reverse-thread of 'Got it all together'</u> is slowing your pace, lingering in a moment of silence with someone trying to compose their thoughts in an inner storm or to find the right word from a jumbled mess of words and phrases. You're kind of at the mercy of the moment and their mind. But there is a dignity acknowledged in me taking time with someone and waiting with them, listening to them.
- <u>The reverse-thread of 'Going somewhere'</u> is that here, people are often in a time in their lives where they find themselves to be in a personal wilderness, so that many feel bewildered and thrown off-balance and alone, not sure which direction to even begin to move toward. In my branch of chaplaincy our stated aim is to 'bring the presence of Christ where it is not expected' and I find this description to be especially apt with my presence among these travelers.
- <u>The reverse-thread of 'Nailin' it'</u> is someone who feels they haven't done anything particularly well in a very, very long time. To be with this person in their sense of defeat, not needing to force a brighter mood with empty platitudes or happy-talk, but really listening and empathizing with them where they are at this moment this is the first and critical posture to take. From here it is sometimes possible to share a different perspective, to sow hope and the possibility of a genuinely better tomorrow.
- <u>The reverse-thread of 'Reaching my goals'</u> is people for whom even modest goals can feel like an impossibly steep climb, far out of reach. My role here again can be to listen with lots of time, not in a hurry. After listening and prayer I often find I can sense the words that I should offer.

Spiritual care in this environment is rarely about big wins or delivering solid measurables. It's much more like tending to a crop than hitting a grand slam home run. You bring water, you prune a little, you fertilize, you pick a few weeds. Lots of silence and serving and work. Any progress at all is indiscernible at first, but over time you do begin to see growth. I'm still so often ill-adjusted to the painful slowness of the pace of things, the awkwardness of the silences. Even still, I think I'm learning

and growing. And once in a while I catch a glimpse of the fruit that is growing too in the lives of others – most of the time out of sight under all the scruff of foliage.



But I think that's how it is with all of us most of the time. We all need something outside ourselves. No man is an island. So reach out, realize that no group of people, no act of service, is beneath you. Do small things with great love, as Mother Teresa used to say.

LOOK WHAT OUR DIOCESE IS DOING -> A UNIQUE AFFORDABLE HOUSING PROJECT

The Anglican Diocese of Huron and St. Paul's Cathedral are a part of an exciting affordable housing initiative in downtown London that will see one of the office buildings repurposed to feature 94 residential units. The property is located at 195 Dufferin Avenue and stands on the diocesan land leased to Sifton Properties Limited, which owns the building.



The project of conversion, officially announced on April 15, is a partnership between Sifton Properties, Homes Unlimited (London) Inc., the Diocese of Huron and St. Paul's Cathedral. Sifton Properties Limited will donate the building and oversee reconstruction phases for Homes Unlimited, who will assume operational responsibilities for the property.

Construction is planned to begin this summer, and the occupancy of 80 one-bedroom and 14 two-bedroom units is expected by fall 2025. The collaboration is seen as an innovative not for profit private partnership model that may contribute to the City of London goal of creating 3,000 new affordable housing units.

For the Diocese of Huron, the project represents the opening stage in the process of transformation of its downtown properties with the idea to reclaim Cathedral's vital role in London's spiritual and social life.

"St. Paul's Cathedral and the Anglican Diocese of Huron recognize this as an environmentally and community leading choice for the property. This is the first step in a multi-stage plan that will see the reimagining of this block into a creative centre hub and neighbourhood in collaboration with the City of London" says Bishop Todd Townshend.

For this purpose, the Diocese has teamed up with <u>Trinity Centres Foundation</u>. They will work together on creative reimagining of St. Paul's and surrounding area, but also of other sites across Huron. More good news to come!!
