A Financial Update

As our parish inevitably continues to age and more of our dear long-time members move on to their next life, our income is starting to reflect this reality. That, together with a slow return to church in the wake of the pandemic, plus the increase in cost for utilities, etc., has made it obvious that our income is not able to keep up with our expenses in the way it has in the past. Fortunately, we do have investments as back up and, as mentioned in the Wardens' Report to Vestry (Jan 2024), we have decided it is prudent to begin using the income from some of our investments to supplement our monthly givings in order to ensure that we remain a viable church for many years to come.

In view of this, in May we began transferring \$1,000 of earned interest per month from our Mackenzie Funds into our operating account. In addition, a few parishioners have generously submitted "top up" donations and we are pleased to report that at the end of May, for the first time in a long time, our net income to date is in the black.

Just a reminder as we move into July, if you're not already signed up for automatic debit, please consider trying it, or alternatively, please submit your offering envelopes before heading off on vacation if at all possible, instead of waiting until you return, to help assure a steady flow of income.

SABBATH REST (from YouVersion daily devotionals)

Humans have a complicated relationship with rules. Even as small children, we struggle to understand the "why" behind them.

Consider how parents teach children to brush their teeth, reminding them morning and night. That child might only appreciate the chore years later, as they grow into adults and experience expensive and uncomfortable dental work. It's then that a dull tooth-brushing routine feels valuable. What a shift in perspective! We weren't made to serve a strict toothbrushing schedule, but toothbrushing was made to serve us to help maintain healthy teeth.



Jesus brings similar wisdom and perspective to the expectation of taking a regular day of rest (Sabbath). The Jews knew that God was insistent on Sabbath observance, but they almost thought of it as if it were a chore. Jesus reminds them that people weren't made for the Sabbath, but the Sabbath was created for people by God to provide much-needed rest. Sabbath rest is God's rhythm to bless us, not God's requirement to burden us.

How can we know this is true? Jesus is the Lord of the Sabbath. He's the maker (and fulfiller) of all God's good rules, and He knows that regular rest is one of the rhythms that leads to an abundant life.
